Following the sucess of the last conference "Antarctica-Music, Sounds and Cultural Connections" at ANU in Canberra, Australia 2011, Buenos Aires will host, "Antarctca Art, Science, People and Polar Dialogs" a fourth conference examining Antarctica from a Cultural perspective.
